



This Telugu song, “**Evarini Poliyunduru?**” (Whom Will You Resemble?), is a lyrical adaptation of Jesus’ famous **Parable of the Wise and Foolish Builders** (Matthew 7:24-27).

Bro Aronkumar Nakrekanti has captured the core spiritual truth that **hearing** God’s word is meaningless unless it is followed by **obedience (doing)**.

Here is a lyrical explanation of the song, connecting its verses to **Psalms, Proverbs, and James** to show how this message resonates with our daily lives.

Lyrical Explanation

Part 1: The Foolish Builder (An Unstable Foundation)

Lyrics:

Explanation: The song begins by depicting a “foolish man” (ஓய்வோடு ஓய்வு எடுத்துக்கொண்டு). He represents a heart that prioritizes comfort over commitment. He chooses “**sand**” (ஓய்வு)—a foundation that requires **no effort** (எடுத்துக்கொண்டு ஓய்வு எடுத்துக்கொண்டு) and provides **ease** (ஓய்வோடு ஓய்வு எடுத்துக்கொண்டு).

In our lives, “sand” is relying on worldly wealth, quick success, or a shallow “spiritual life” that avoids the sacrifice of following Jesus. However, the song warns that “**the rain came, and the flood came**” (ஓய்வு எடுத்துக்கொண்டு ஓய்வு எடுத்துக்கொண்டு).

Biblical Connection: The Deception of Folly

1. Proverbs: The Vulnerability of Folly. Proverbs describes folly as attractive but lacking real protection. The foolish man’s ease is a dangerous delusion.

*“For the waywardness of the simple will kill them, and the **complacency of fools will destroy them.**” — Proverbs 1:32*

2. James: The Uselessness of Shifting Faith. James connects a shifting, uncommitted heart to the motion of sand and waves. A “hearer only” is unstable in every area of life when trials strike.

*“He must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is **like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind.** That person should not expect to receive anything from the Lord.” — [James 1:6-7](#)*

3. Psalms: No Safety Outside of God. The foolish man believes his “house” (his achievements or wealth) makes him secure. The Psalms declare this is a lie.

*“Unless the Lord builds the house, **the builders labor in vain.** Unless the Lord watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain.” — Psalm 127:1*



Part 2: The Wise Builder (A Stable Foundation)

Lyrics:

I have built my house on the Rock,
 My foundation is the Word of God.
 When the rains come and the floods arrive,
 My house will stand strong and true.

Explanation: The song contrasts this with the “wise man” (புத்தியமானவன்). His life is built on the “**Rock**” (பாறை)—which is the Word of Jesus. This builder acknowledges that building a true life requires “**struggle/effort**” (சுரண்டல்/உழைப்பு). He digs deep, meaning he spends time understanding God’s will and changing his behavior to match. When the same “**rains and floods**” arrive, his house stands “**strong**” (கொடிக்கொடி) because his character is anchored in truth.



Biblical Connection: The Protection of Obedience

1. Psalms: God is the Unshakable Rock. The Psalms are full of declarations that God is our foundation, our safe harbor, and our stable fortress. We must choose to stand upon Him.

*“Truly He is my **rock and my salvation**; He is my fortress, **I will never be shaken.**” — Psalm 62:2*

2. Proverbs: Wisdom Leads to Security. While folly provides temporary ease, true security comes through walking in God’s path.

*“Whoever listens to me [Wisdom] will **live in safety and be at ease**, without dread of harm.” — Proverbs 1:33*

3. James: The Joy of the ‘Doer.’ This is the central connection. The wise builder is a “doer” of the word, not just a “hearer.” His daily obedience is what builds the fortress around his soul.



“But whoever looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues in it—not forgetting what they have heard, but **doing it—they will be blessed in what they do.**” — [James 1:25](#)

Part 3: The Call to Choose (A Practical Mirror)

Lyrics:

Explanation: The final verse makes the song’s meaning explicit. The builders are metaphorical.



- **Wise Men:** Those who “**listen to Jesus’ word**” (සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා). Their life is defined by active faith.
- **Foolish Men:** Those who “**choose the worldly path**” (සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා). Their life is defined by passive hearing.

The song concludes with a final question that forces every listener to look at their own foundation: “**Whom do you resemble?**” (සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා සඳහා?).

Resonating Message: The Critical Moment

This song resonates because everyone experiences “rains and floods”—the loss of a job, sickness, betrayal, or heartbreak. The song’s message is a mirror: It doesn’t ask *if* you believe in God, but rather, *does your belief change how you live when you think no one is watching?*

It reminds us that the “struggle” of prayer, study, and daily choosing God’s way over the “easy path” of sand is the only thing that will keep us standing when everything else collapses.
